CABINET LEAKS RAISES VOTERS CONCERNS

The news of another cabinet leak has raised concern amongst voters.

The strength and reliability of the Labor government is being questioned after Prime Minister Julia Gillard was forced to defend herself against accusations that she was against senior pension rises and paid parental leave and she was quoted as saying; "old people never vote for us."
